

### Kurt Vonnegut Galapagos

Offers an examination of the works of the American science fiction writer.

My dissertation examines the works of Herman Melville, Tennessee Williams, and Kurt Vonnegut, along with two twenty-first century popular fiction writers. The Galapagos Islands connect the disparate group of authors and unite them in a common pursuit, which is the exploration of humankind's place in what can be a harsh universe. Melville wrote "The Encantadas" in 1854, five years before Darwin's Origin of Species (1859), but his writings evince a concern with what he saw as an unwelcoming world and what the role of human beings was in that world. Upon Darwin's publication of Origin, humanity's existence became more problematical; writers and philosophers have grappled with its implications ever since. Because the impact of Darwinism is widespread, the Galapagos can serve as a filtering device by which to examine American responses to Darwinism. The Galapagos Islands have risen from obscurity primarily because of Darwin's 1835 visit. His admission that the archipelago prompted many questions into the nature of speciation sparked an interest in the islands that steadily grew. After a brief history of the idea of evolution in America in Chapter 1, Chapter 2 traces the rise in popularity that the islands underwent from 1850 to 2002. A sampling of the periodical literature shows the different ways that the islands have been portrayed for the last century and a half. Chapter 3 examines "The Encantadas" and Darwin's Voyage of the Beagle (1839, revised 1847) to discern the attitude with which each author treats the islands and what each of them suggests about the nature of life. Chapter 4 discusses Tennessee William's play, Suddenly Last Summer (1959), which incorporates elements of Freudian and Darwinian theory. Chapter 5 examines the use of the Galapagos by two contemporary authors, Cathleen Schine, and Gregg Andrew Hurwitz. Their novels, The Evolution of Jane (1998) and Minutes to Burn (2001), use the islands as a place to contemplate Darwinian themes. The final chapter, Chapter 6, discusses Kurt Vonnegut's Galapagos (1985) and inspects his response to Darwin's theory of natural selection. The Galapagos Islands serve as a common ground for authors from different time periods and geographical places. Through each author's contemplation of the islands and the theories they symbolize, we gain insight into the ways Darwinism has affected America since its inception.

The motifs of island and shipwreck have been present in literature and the arts from ancient times. The essays in this volume explore shipwreck and island figures together in literary texts, films, Reality TV, music, and art.

With the success of Slaughterhouse-Five (1969), Kurt Vonnegut cemented his reputation as America's funniest and most original satirist. This third volume of the definitive edition of his fiction collects four novels written in the 1970s and '80s, when Vonnegut was at the height of his storytelling powers. Slapstick (1976) takes the form of the post-apocalyptic memoirs of Wilbur Daffodil-11 Swain, architect of a

Jailbird (1979) is a political fable of our time, the biography of a good man who becomes embroiled in several of the worst political scandals of the American Century. Galapagos (1985), a favorite of the author's among his books, tells the story of how and why a million years ago—during the global ecological disaster of 1986—humankind embarked on an unlikely evolution. The volume is rounded out with an assortment of Vonnegut rarities: speeches, essays, and commentary from the period that touch upon the themes, incidents, and particulars of the novels. Excerpt: Slaughterhouse-Five, or The Children's Crusade: A Duty-Dance with Death (1969) is a satirical novel by Kurt Vonnegut about World War II experiences and journeys through time of a soldier called Billy Pilgrim. Ranked the 18th greatest English language novel of the 20th century by Modern Library, it is generally recognized as Vonnegut's most influential and popular work. Chaplain's Assistant Billy Pilgrim is a disoriented, fatalistic, and ill-trained American soldier. He does not like wars and is captured by the Germans during the Battle of the Bulge. The Germans put Billy and his fellow prisoners in a disused slaughterhouse (although there are animal carcasses hanging in the underground shelter) in Dresden. Their building is known as "Slaughterhouse number 5." During the bombing, the POWs and German guards alike hide in a deep cellar. Because of their safe hiding place, they are some of the few survivors of the city-destroying firestorm. Billy has become "unstuck in time" and experiences past and future events out of sequence and repetitively, following a nonlinear narrative. He is kidnapped by extraterrestrial aliens from the planet Traalfamadore. They exhibit him in a zoo with B-movie starlet Montana Wildhack as his mate. The Traalfamadorian, who can see in four dimensions, have already seen every instant of their lives. They say they cannot choose to change anything about their fates, but can choose to concentrate upon any moment in their lives, and Billy becomes convinced of the veracity of their theories. The role of fiction in both understanding and interpreting the world has recently become an increasingly important topic for many of the human sciences. This volume of Osiris focuses on the relationship between a particular genre of storytelling—science fiction (SF), told through a variety of media—and the history of science. The protagonists of these two enterprises have a lot in common. Both SF and the history of science are oriented towards the (re)construction of unfamiliar worlds; both are fascinated by the ways in which natural and social systems interact; both are critically aware of the different ways in which the social (class, gender, race, sex, species) has inflected the experience of the scientific. The essays consider the role played by SF in the history of specific scientific disciplines, topics, or cultures, as well as the ways in which it has helped to move scientific concepts, methodologies, and practices between wider cultural areas. Ultimately, Presenting Futures Past explores what SF can tell us about the histories of the future, how different communities have envisaged their futures, and how SF conveys the socioscientific claims of past presents.

Since they lie more than 900 miles west of South America and were never connected to the mainland, almost all plant and animal life arrived here by chance. Kurt Vonnegut's darkly comic work became a symbol for the counterculture of a generation. From his debut novel, Player Piano (1951) through seminal 1960's novels such as Cat's Cradle (1963) and Slaughterhouse-Five (1969) up to the recent success of A Man Without A Country (2005), Vonnegut's writing has remained commercially popular, offering a satirical yet optimistic outlook on modern life. Though many fellow writers admired Vonnegut - Gore Vidal famously suggesting that "Kurt was never dull" - the academic establishment has tended to retain a degree of scepticism concerning the validity of his work. This dynamic collection aims to re-evaluate Vonnegut's position as an integral part of the American post-war cannon of literature.
